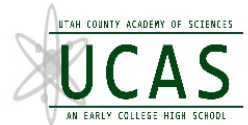

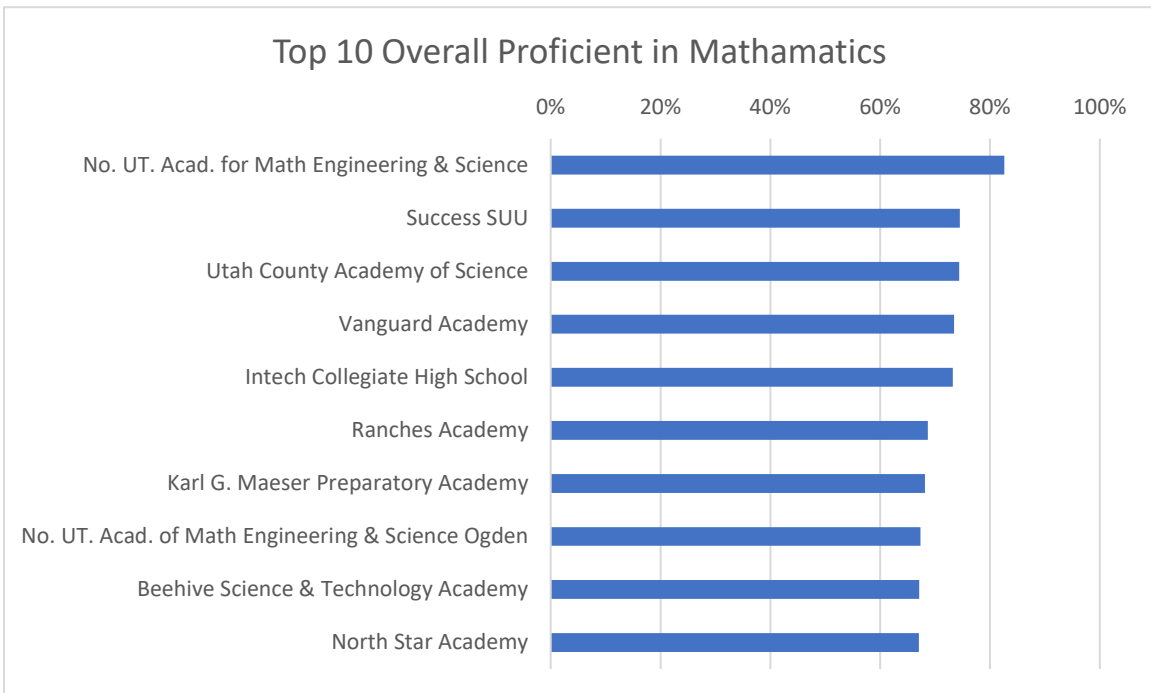
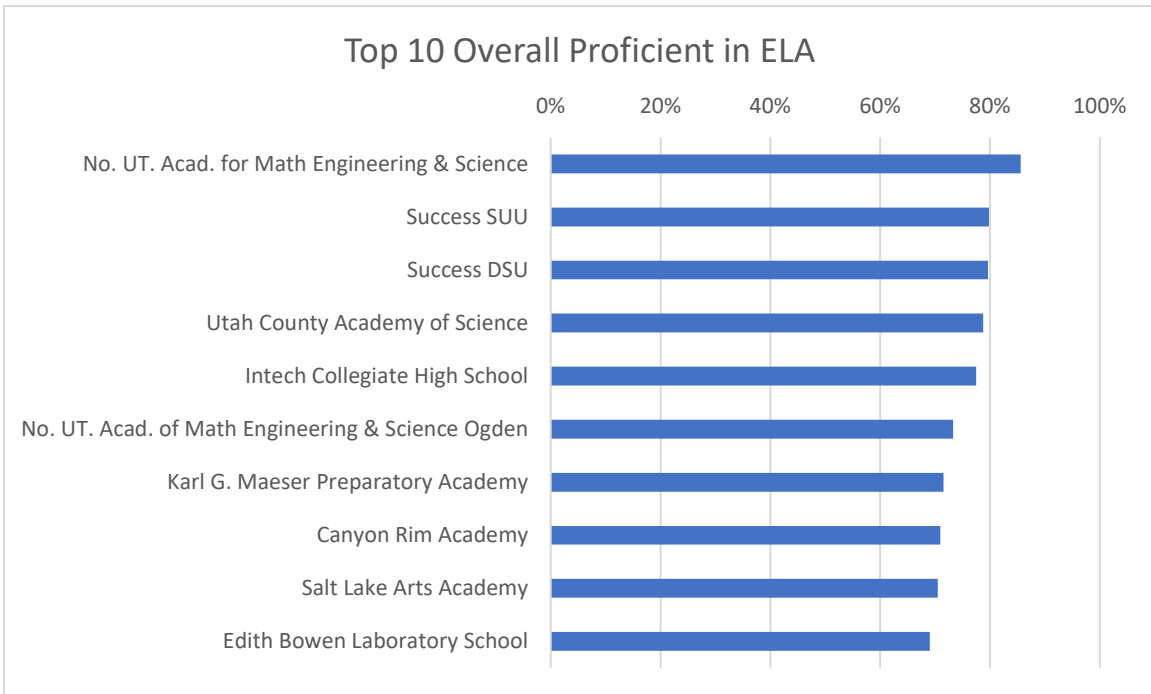
Proficiency Levels

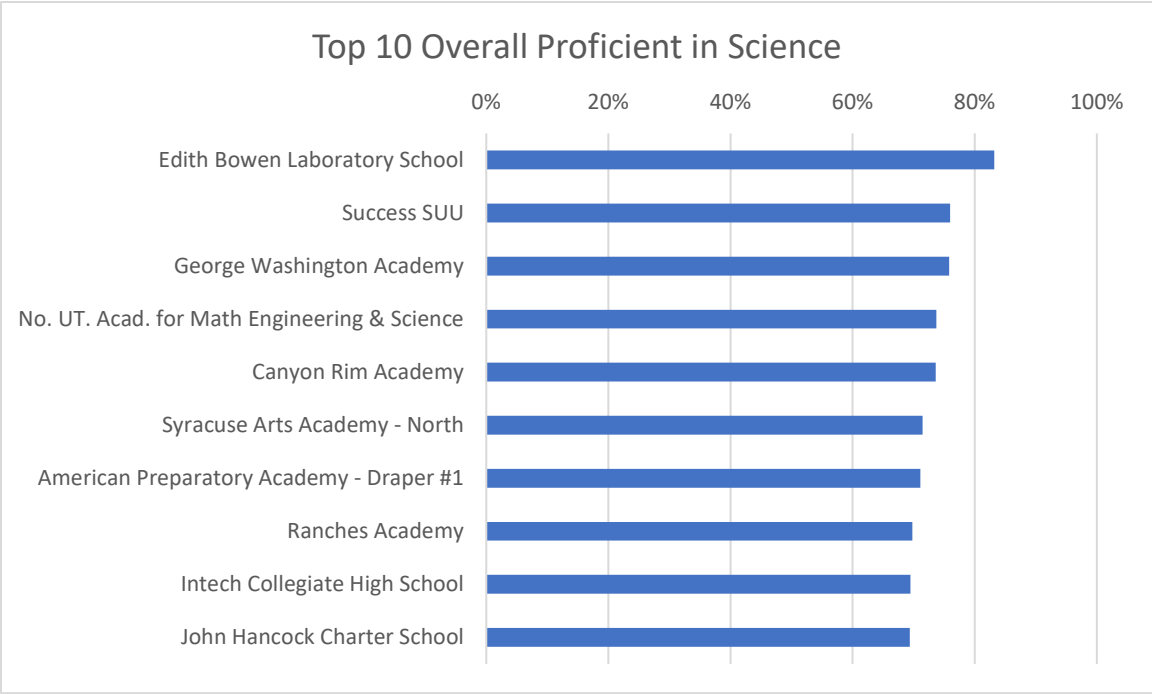
Charter school’s proficiency rates improved this year. Charter school’s proficiency levels in both Math and Science are approaching district school’s levels. Proficiency in English Language Arts improved by 2 percentage points following the growing trend seen in charters proficiency levels across all subjects.

Top 10 Charter Schools with Highest Overall Proficiency





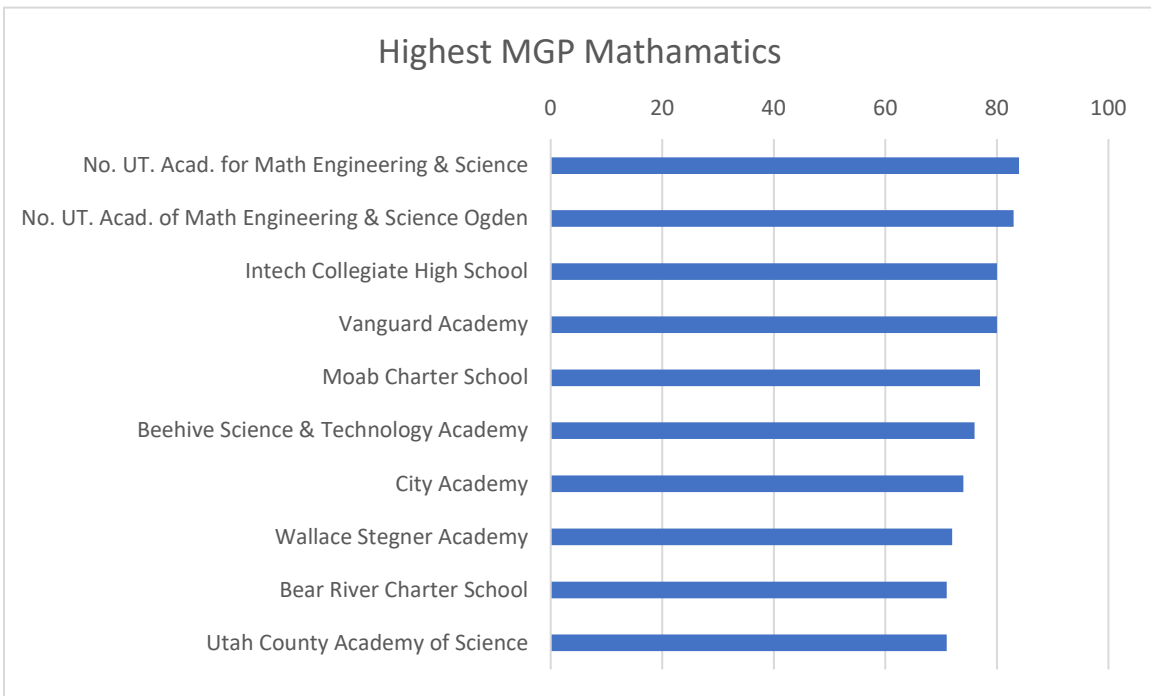
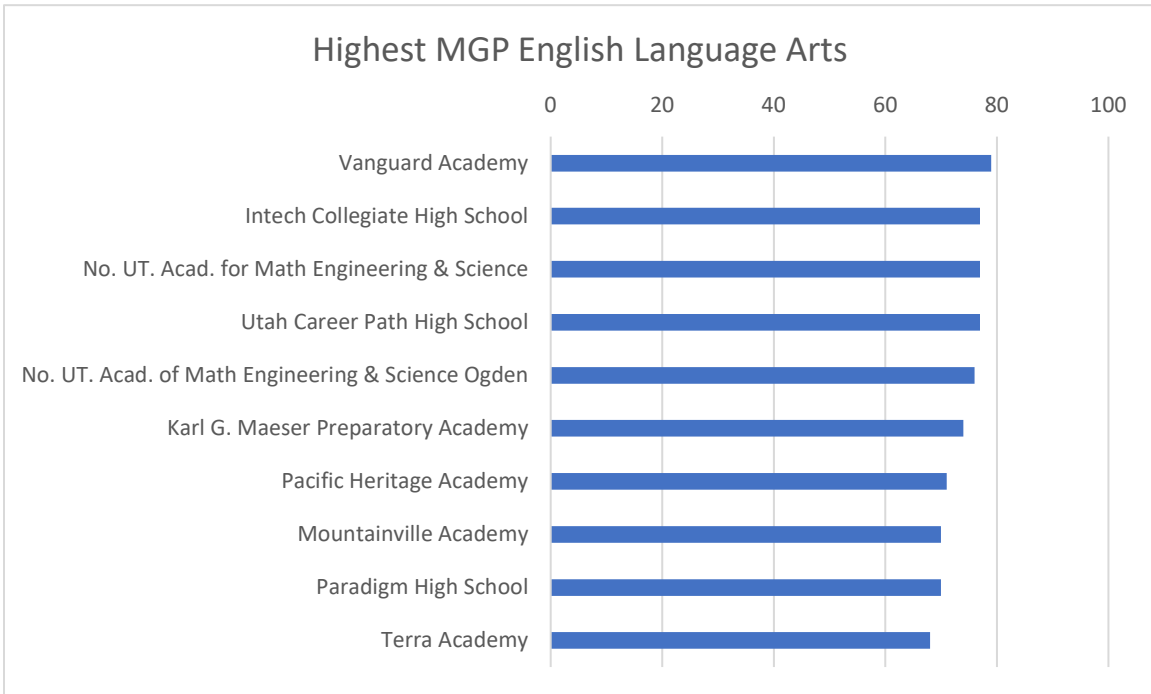
Median Growth Percentile

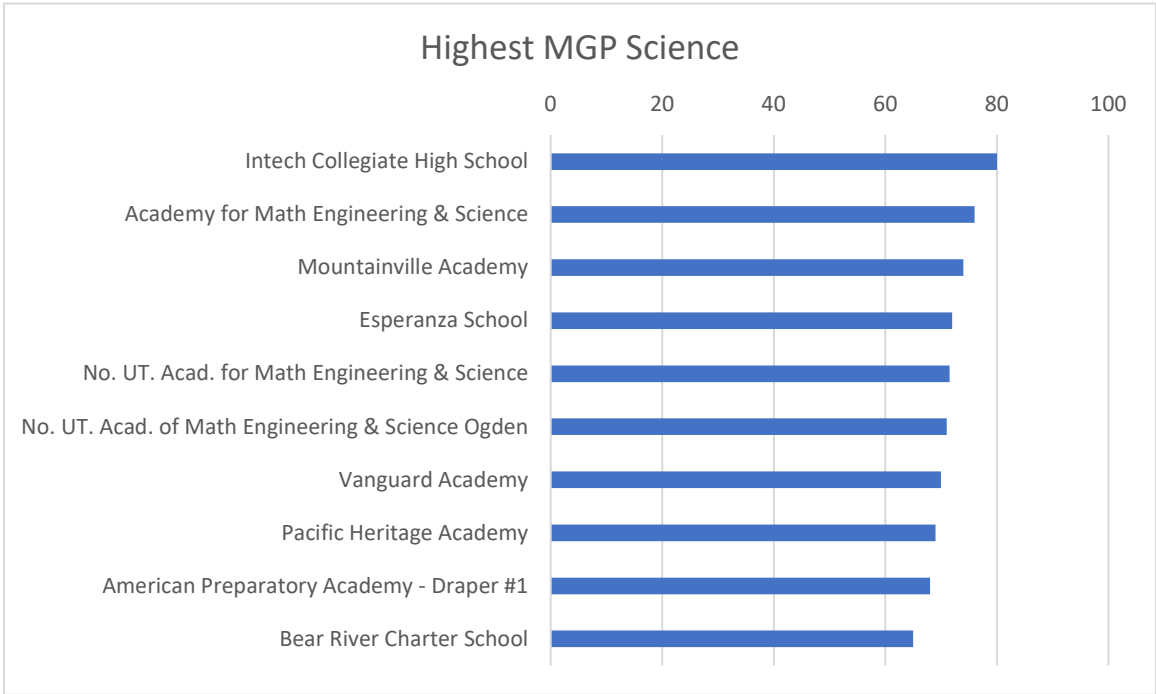
The Median Growth Percentile is defined as “...the median of all the student growth percentiles (SGP) of the given group...Student Growth Percentiles are a normed measurement that are normed at a state level. This means the state median for all subjects and tests is 50.” (Utah State Board of Education SGP report SY2020 notes)

Charters outperformed both the state average and district schools in both English Language Arts and Science growing by four percentage points in English Language Arts and one percent in Science. Charters were just behind the state average and district growth in Mathematics by a little over one percentage point.

In SY2020, a total of \$805,015 was awarded amongst the following schools:

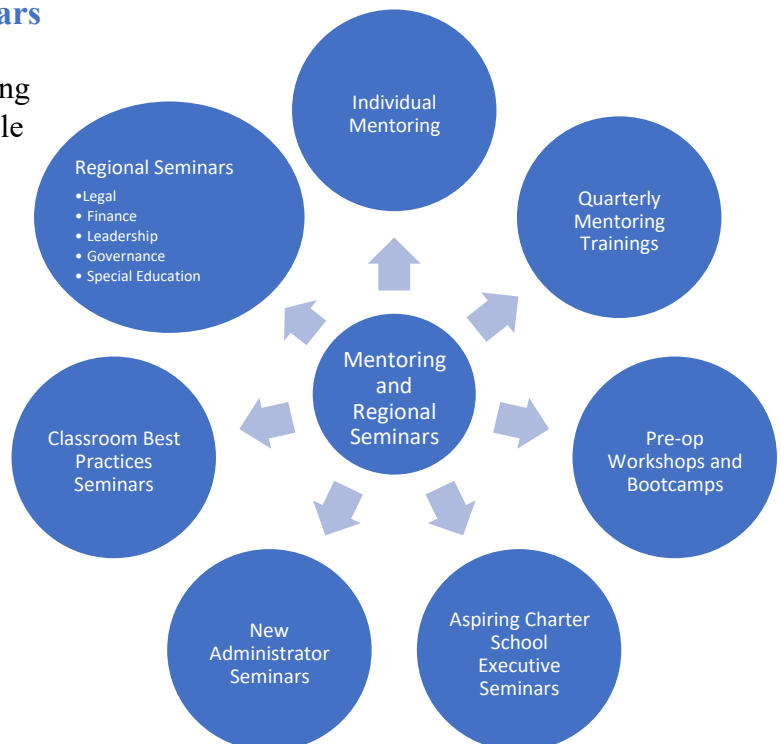

The SCSB offers many mentoring and training opportunities. Annually, \$200,000 is available for mentoring and \$200,000 for regional seminars.

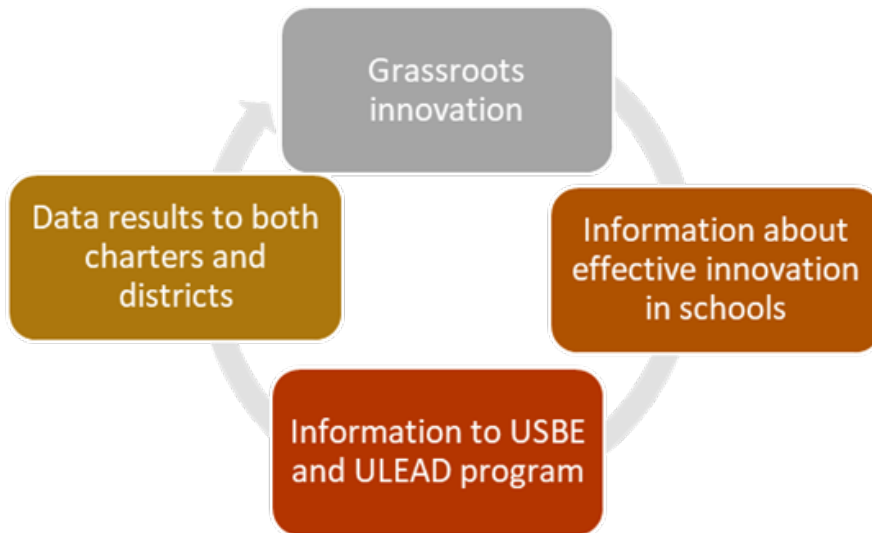

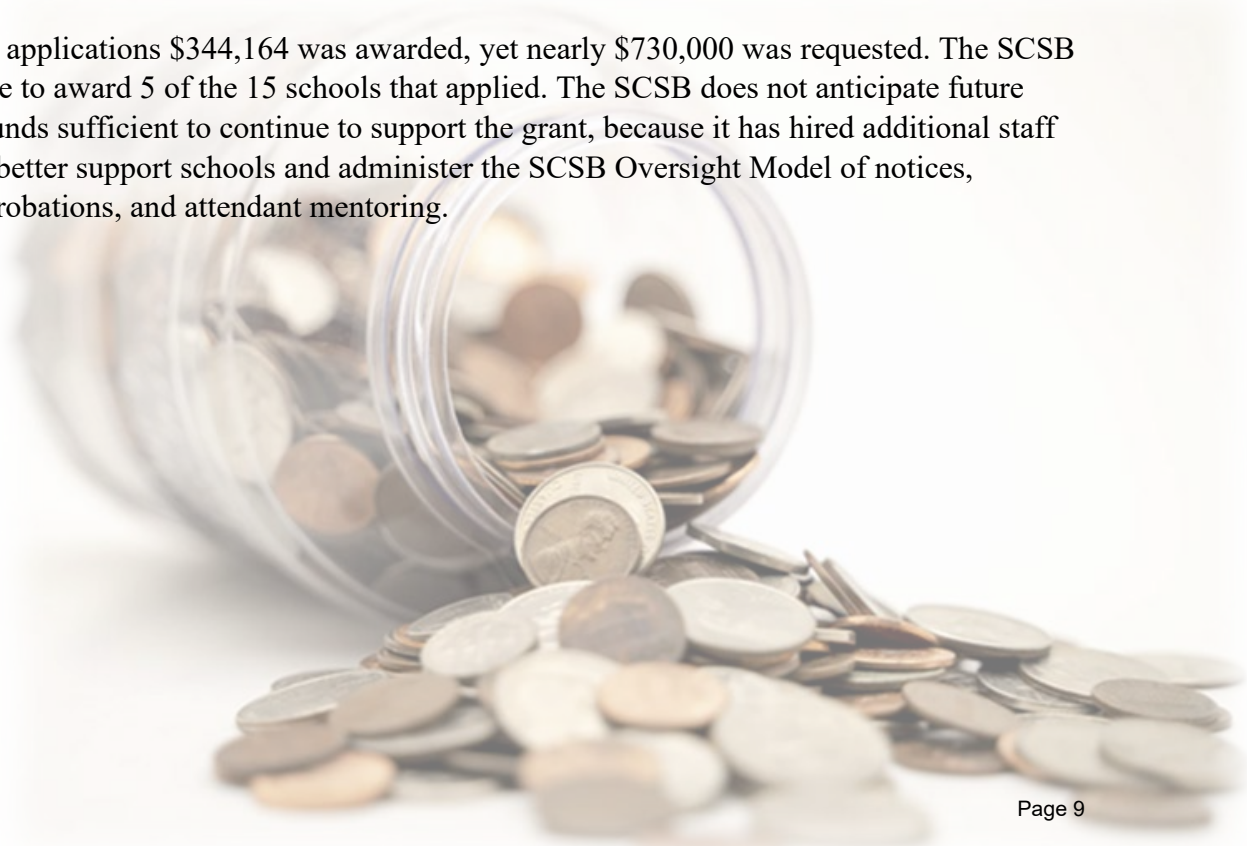


Innovative Student Improvement Program (ISIP)

In fall of 2016, the SCSB created the ISIP using carry-forward funds from SCSB's general operation budget. Schools could request up to \$100,000. To receive the funds, schools had to agree to collect and share with the SCSB their student outcome data on the effectiveness of the innovative program. In the first two rounds of the ISIP grant, the SCSB awarded \$417,874 to nine schools.



Of the FY19 applications \$344,164 was awarded, yet nearly \$730,000 was requested. The SCSB was only able to award 5 of the 15 schools that applied. The SCSB does not anticipate future carry-over funds sufficient to continue to support the grant, because it has hired additional staff members to better support schools and administer the SCSB Oversight Model of notices, Warnings, Probations, and attendant mentoring.



The SCSB found great success with this grant program, identifying four key takeaways:

The image displays four key takeaways from the ISIP program, each in a colored box:

- Grassroots seed money is critical for school innovation** (Orange box)
- ISIP allowed for nimble, low risk innovations** (Reddish-brown box)
- Several innovations provided suggestions for replication, but not all needed to be scalable** (Light brown box)
- Schools are good stewards of money, creating positive results and usable data with minimal investment** (Grey box)

Based on the success of 4 years of the ISIP program the SCSB seeks to continue the ISIP program through appeals to the legislature. Grants have been successfully awarded to individual schools according to (1) the strength of their vision for the use of grant money and their preparation to implement the grants, and (2) the school’s demonstrated ability to track and analyze the results of the grant, and willingness to allow the SCSB and district or state officials to review and analyze the results. The following schools were awarded ISIP grants for FY2019-FY2020.

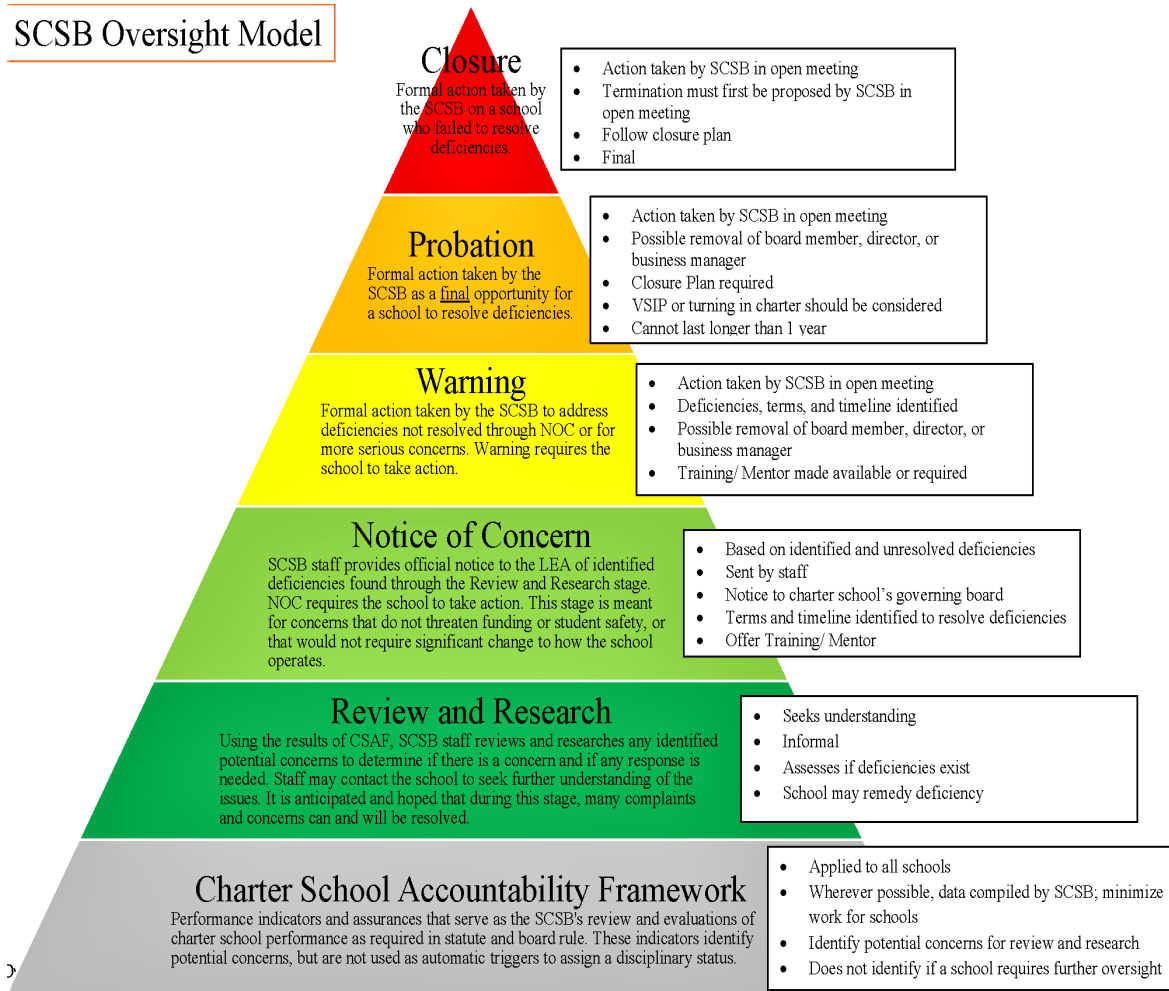
SCSB Supportive Oversight

The SCSB is charged with developing a system/model for monitoring the performance of the schools authorized by the SCSB in accordance with UCA §53G-5-501, UCA §53G-5-202(1), and Utah Administrative Rule R277-481. It is hoped that through effective implementation of this model, the SCSB will lift the quality and reputation of all charter schools.

Oversight Model

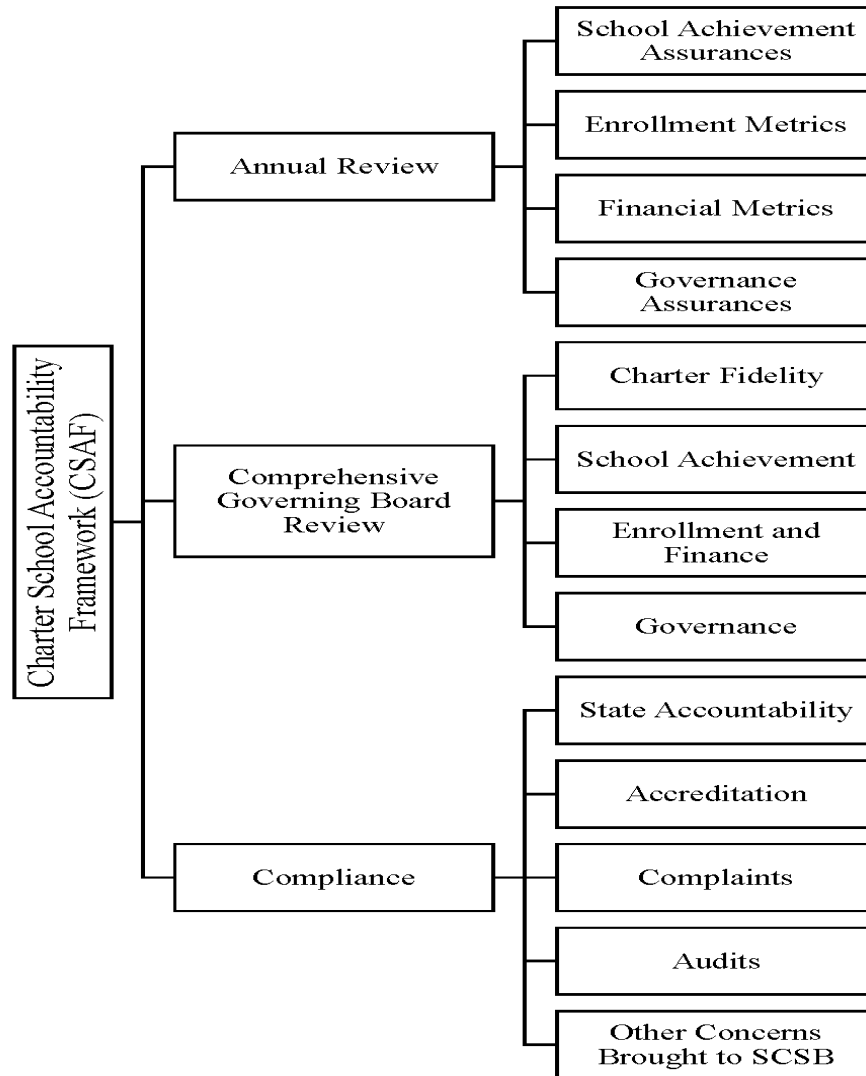
The Charter School Oversight Model details the steps SCSB staff take to resolve concerns/deficiencies, as well as the Warning and Probation statuses outlined in Utah Administrative Rule R277-481.

Charter School Accountability Framework (CSAF)

The purpose of CSAF is to identify potential concerns by providing objective, reliable, and sustainable warning indicators of overall school performance and viability.



Annual Review

According to UCA §53G-5-202(1)(b), the State Charter School Board (SCSB) is to “annually review and evaluate the performance of charter schools...and hold the schools accountable for their performance.” As part of this review, SCSB authorized schools assure to a list of governance indicators. These assurances cover areas of school achievement, enrollment, finance, and governance, and are completed by school directors and certified by governing board chairs via the UCAP (Utah Charter Access Point).

Comprehensive Governing Board Review

The SCSB is obligated, under administrative rule R277-481-3A(3), to conduct “a comprehensive review of governing board performance at least once every five years.” The SCSB has implemented this review, assessing school specific goals in the Charter Agreement, fidelity to the school’s Charter Agreement, long-term enrollment and financial trends, and governing board performance (focusing on the assurances in the annual review). Data for this review is taken from existing sources to reduce the amount of work of school personnel. SCSB staff may conduct an onsite school visit or request data on school goals not otherwise available through existing reports. In addition, SCSB staff attend regularly scheduled governing board meetings and review meeting agendas and materials made available to the public according to statute. The burden to schools is minimal.

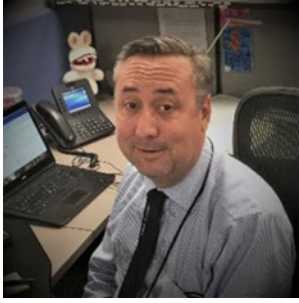

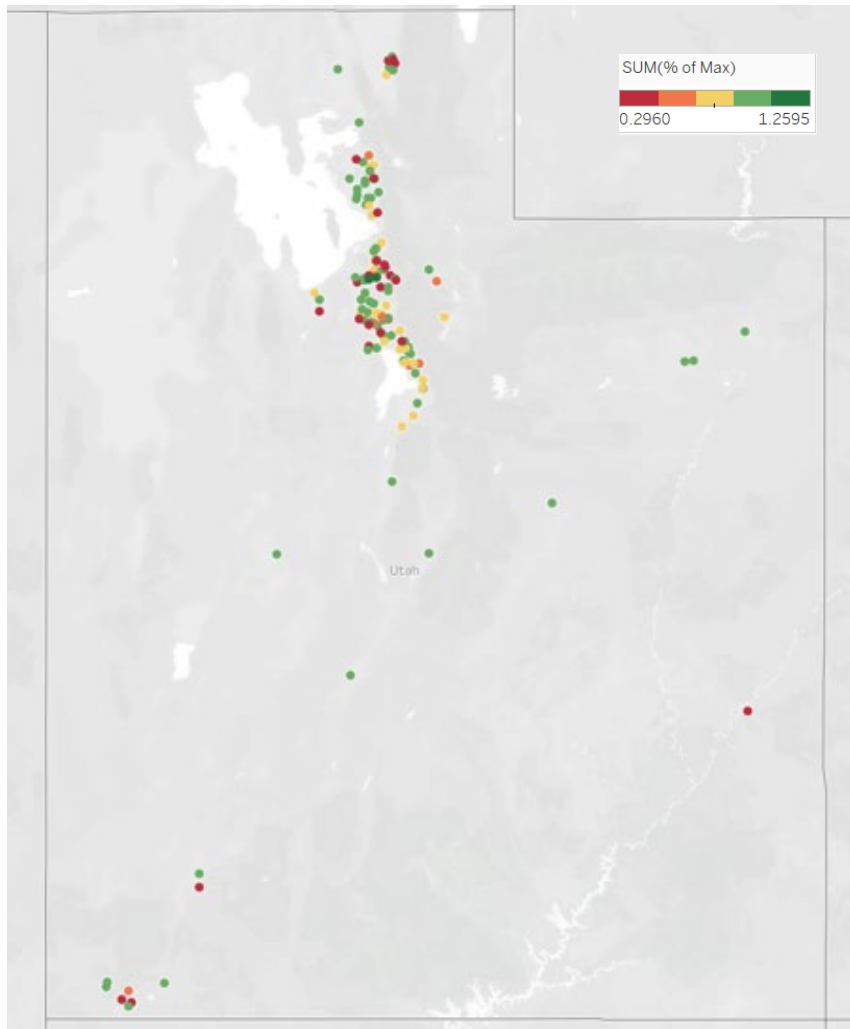
